# Message fom MSC Chairperson

Whilst 1995 to 2002 was arguably the Multicultural Services Centre's (MSC) most turbulent period and the period up to 2012 its road to recovery, its third decade can best be described as a period of settling in and growing.

I have been very fortunate in being the Chair of the Multicultural Services Centre since its thirtieth anniversary for it arguably has been MSC's golden period since its inception in 1980.

Its unrivalled range of programs and services for culturally and linguistically diverse (CaLD) Western Australians has continued to expand and its person-centred approach reflected by its service philosophy of providing services in the preferred language of service participants has been further strengthened with its 200 staff, speaking about 68 different languages.

In 2020-21, MSC's annual turnover exceeded \$10 million, its net equity was \$6.78 million and, as in previous decades, the external quality audits have been flattering and not just complimentary.

We most certainly didn't achieve all of this accidentally. Some of the reasons include our:

- Capacity to attract and retain knowledgeable, skilled, experienced and dedicated board members, staff and volunteers.
- Willingness to be the lead agency or more often than not, a member of consortia led by other agencies, which have successfully bid for programs and services.
- Strategic planning years in advance, which has reaped rich dividends.
- Willingness to take informed risks with all of them paying rich dividends.

Since the 30th anniversary we have changed our logo and added the tag line, "Individualised, Innovative and Integrated" and whilst our services have been individualised, and integrated for many years the last ten have also been very innovative.

Examples of the latter include our Jobs and Skills Centre program's joint initiative with the Muresk Institute which prepared mostly refugees to acquire knowledge and skills to work in agriculture; our Vimauna project that is raising awareness of family and domestic violence (FDV) within CaLD communities and focusing on perpetrators and potential perpetrators to diminish FDV significantly; and most importantly our corporate social responsibility, "My Home project". It continues to operate without any external funding and it has already saved the WA taxpayers more than \$17 million in terms of the value of redundant bed days.

Former Liberal Immigration Minister, the Hon Philip Ruddock once famously referred to MSC as the beacon amongst Migrant Resource Centres, which was echoed by our former Prime Minister the Hon. Julia Gillard in her 30th anniversary video message. But at the end of the day, MSC is not about its board, its staff, its volunteers or indeed the many strategic partners and funding bodies that have supported us over the years. Why we exist and what we do is all about our service participants, and this is epitomized by numerous compliments that they have generously shared with us.

The people who have made significant contributions to the Centre are too numerous to list in this message. Arguably the most crucial contribution remains that of the Hon. Richard Court who was the WA Premier when the Minister for Immigration, the Hon Nick Bolkus, made the astounding and indefensible decision to cease the core funding of the Centre in 1995. So, we continue to remain indebted to the Hon. Richard Court and indeed all those who have assisted the Centre over the years.

# Against all Odds

## Introduction

"Against All Odds" was chosen as the name of this publication to mark the 40th anniversary of the Multicultural Services Centre (MSC), for it portrays what it had to overcome, not just to survive as described in the historical background section, but the difficulties it continually overcomes in its rapid growth in an ever-increasing competitive community services environment. Incidentally, the name of the video that was produced to mark this occasion was changed from "Against All Odds" to "I live for Mondays."

This video is the proverbial labour of love of Devlin Bose, our Team Leader Housing, and Brian Balen, our former Media Services Director. It is dedicated to Aunty Maria a consumer of our Commonwealth Home Support Program. She shared the four very powerful words, "I live for Mondays" three days before her passing, when our CEO visited her at a hospice along with a volunteer, and another consumer.

To contextualise this, Monday is the day that Aunty Maria accessed our Aged Care services. In the last 40 years MSC has attracted loads of memorable testimonials from various sources, but, nothing comes remotely close to those four words for they epitomise why the MSC board, staff and volunteers do what they do. The historical background section refers to a calamitous period for MSC, which could have

resulted in the centre ceasing its operations. Instead, it galvanised the board, staff and many well-wishers/stakeholders to do what was required and what seemed impossible, to make MSC the premier multicultural services provider that it is today.

The efforts of the board, staff, volunteers and other key stakeholders as well as the contributions and support of the Richard Court state government were critical in ensuring the Centre's survival and these were detailed in the publication "A History of Achievement".

MSC is arguably the largest provider of multicultural and multilingual services in WA and the key features of its success are:

It is Multicultural not just in name but in terms of its service diversity and personnel who deliver them in the preferred language of the consumer.





# Historical Background

In the publication "A History of Achievement" (2002) the late Russell Raymond OAM who served a total of seventeen years as the Chairperson of MSC and the North Perth Migrant Resource Centre (NPMRC) as it was called initially, outlined in detail the establishment of the Centre and the trials and tribulations it experienced in its first 20 years.



As Russell described in that publication,

"January 30, 1980 was a hot steamy afternoon when about 250 men, women and a spattering of children crowded into the North Perth Town Hall to witness the birth of what was to become the first Migrant Resource Centre in Western Australia. Competition was intense with as many as 170 organisations and individuals entitled to jockey for board positions on the day. A total of 33 nominations were received for the same."

Unlike resource centres established in Wollongong, Liverpool and Melbourne where members of the management committee were appointed by the then Minister for Immigration, the ethnic communities in Perth stubbornly resisted Ministerial directives. All but three members of the first management committee were elected by the members. This was arguably the first signs of the Centre's renowned willingness to carve its own path which led the then Minister of Immigration the Hon Philip Ruddock to describe NPMRC as "a beacon amongst migrant centres".

The North Perth Migrant Resource Centre was officially opened on 2nd June 1981 by the Federal Member for Perth, Mr. Ross McLean and on 3rd August 1982 it was certified as an incorporated body under the Associations Incorporation Act 1895.

The period that followed the astounding and indefensible decision of the then Minister for Immigration, the Hon Nick Bolkus in 1995 to cease the core funding of the Centre was arguably the most traumatic part of its history. But it was also the period that defined the Centre's ethos and dogged determination not just to survive but to become an exemplary provider of multicultural and multilingual services. With a service philosophy of providing services in the preferred language of the consumer, 200 staff who speak 80+ languages/dialects implementing it; and the provision of an unrivalled array of programs and services, it has justly laid claim to have achieved that objective.

On the 10th of June 2002 the North Perth Migrant Resource Centre became an incorporated body under the Associations Incorporation Act 1987 in its current name of the Multicultural Services Centre of Western Australia Incorporated.

The history of the Centre can be divided into four broad periods namely


- 1. Early Years (Inception to 1995)
- 2. Turbulent Years (1995 to 2002)
- 3. On the Road to Recovery (2002 -2012)
- 4 Settled in and Growing (from 2012

The first two were covered by "A History of Achievement (2002) publication and the third was covered by the Publication Multicultural Services Centre 30 Years On (2012).

This publication will focus on the post 2012 period and will highlight some of the notable/ interesting achievements/milestones. More details of the same can be accessed from our annual reports published on our website www.mscwa.com.au/publications/annual-reports/

But first, this publication wishes to pay respects to some key people who made significant contributions to the Centre and have passed on. They are in chronological order of passing:

## In Memoriam



### Vale Claudio Pierluigi

Claudio was a social worker by profession and as the first Director of the Centre he oversaw the development of culturally and linguistically appropriate service provision in the areas of settlement, employment and training, housing and home and community care for the frail aged and young people with disabilities.

Regrettably the Centre lost the services of an accomplished professional when Claudio accepted the position of Director Government and Community Relations with the then Multicultural and Ethnic Affairs Commission. At the time of his very premature passing he was a Director of Helen Catalini and Associates.



### Vale Thevant Fitzgerald

Thevant Fitzgerald's period as Treasurer was an important one for the Multicultural Services Centre as it emerged from the red and moved solidly into the black

Her involvement was not just restricted to her duties as Treasurer. She willingly volunteered to chair the Female Genital Mutilation Video project steering committee and was also a member of the Multicultural Housing Advocacy Program steering committee. Thevant also keenly pursued several issues through the Ethnic Communities Council with regard to interpreting services and young people. She was also a great supporter of the Centre's Vietnamese HACC services. She was well liked and respected by all staff and board members and that's not surprising given her easy going and friendly nature.

#### Vale Albert Cheong

Albert Cheong made substantial contributions to the Centre as a board member and as Treasurer. He oversaw a period of steady growth in the Centre's income and his wise counsel led to a significant growth in the Centre's assets. Albert was a Practicing Chartered Tax Adviser and Public Accountant with extensive experience in the multicultural sector given his involvement in a number of ethnic organisations in Perth since 1982. This included the Ethnic Communities Council of WA. He was a gifted musician (mastered several instruments) and was one of the pioneers of the Ethnic Music Centre in Perth, which subsequently became the Multicultural Arts Centre of WA and Kulcha.

#### Vale Sam Piantadosi JP OMRI FOC

Sam was a member of the interim Committee that established the North Perth Migrant Resource Centre (NPMRC) in 1980. (The North Perth Migrant Resource Centre changed its name to the Multicultural Services Centre in 2001.) He was NPMRC's Founding Vice President and served for four years in that capacity. He subsequently served as a Board Member for several years including at the time of his passing.

The many positions he held besides the above include Founder of the Stirling Ethnic Aged Homes Association, Founding President of the Ethnic Communities Council of WA, Honorary Patron of the Chinese Community Centre of WA, and the Chinese Community Centre School.


#### Vale Russell Raymond OAM

The passing of Russell on 25th August 2019 marked an end of a great era in the annals of both the Multicultural Services Centre of Western Australia (MSC) and the Ethnic Communities Council of WA (ECCWA). His substantial contribution significantly influenced the growth and development of the Centre. Russell served on the Centre's board of management in various capacities, since its establishment in 1980. He was the Chairperson or Vice Chairperson for most of the 40 years. Russell along with other board members guided the Centre (North Perth Migrant Resource Centre as it was then called) through its tough times when its core funding of about \$250,000 was terminated by the federal government. The fact that MSC is now by far the largest multicultural services provider in WA has a lot to do with the stewardship of Russell, as well as the time, efforts, and support he extended to achieve that outcome. Russell had a great impact on many past and present staff and board members of not just MSC and ECCWA and they include the Australia Day Council, AdvoCare, Umbrella Community Services, the Sri Lankan Association of WA etc. At the national level, Russell was as a Dy Chairperson representing WA on the FECCA Executive for more than 5 years. He served FECCA in other capacities namely Honorary Secretary for 4 years, its representative on the SBS Community Advisory Committee for many years, its representative on a Commonwealth Aged Care Committee etc.











#### Vale Graeme Windsor

Mr. Graeme Windsor a board member of our Centre for many years passed away on Tuesday, 4th August 2020. Graeme was a Solicitor and Accredited Mediator and served as a Lawyer with the Australian Government Solicitor (AGS) for 28 years. He was the Director of its Perth Office from December 1997 - January 2014. Graeme was the Dy. Convenor of the WA Law Society's Government/In house lawyers committee and was also a member of its Alternative Dispute Resolution Committee. Graeme was also a Lecturer, College of Law, in Perth. Obituaries in memoriam remind us of "a gentle man known for his integrity, loyalty, love of family, friends, reading and music" and that he had "an amazing memory of past events, love of books and encyclopaedic knowledge of music. A charming man with many cherished friends."

### Vale Nick Agocs OAM

Nick Agocs, (Miklos Szaszak) was an outstanding Australian and the quantum of his work in the multicultural sector is unrivalled, with most of it done voluntarily.

Nick was a founding board member of the North Perth Migrant Resource Centre which became the Multicultural Services Centre of Western Australia (MSCWA) in 2002. He served as Chair, Deputy Chair, and in other capacities for decades. When the centre was defunded, Nick, along with others, played a significant role in ensuring that the centre continued to operate successfully.

He helped revive the Ethnic Communities Council of WA (ECCWA) in 1980 and served as President, Senior Vice President, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Assistant Treasurer and management committee member. Nick also served the Federation of Ethnic Communities Councils of Australia (FECCA) in the roles of Senior Deputy Chair, Deputy Chair and other office bearer positions longer than any other Western Australian. As with the ECCWA, his contribution to FECCA was outstanding. For this FECCA awarded him one of only three life memberships given to Western Australians in the last 40 years.




### Vale Emeritus Professor Laksiri Jayasuriya AM

Emeritus Professor Laksiri Jayasuriya AM had a long and distinguished record of engagement in public affairs at international, national and state levels. He has led the way in charting new directions for Australian multiculturalism and citizenship. He was the first Asian to be appointed to the Immigration Advisory Council and was Chairman, National Advisory and Coordinating Committee on Multicultural Education. His significant contribution to the formulation of WA's Multiculturalism Charter (2004) as well as the establishment of Australia's first Anti-Racism Strategy led us to fondly refer to him as the Father of Multiculturalism.

### Vale Gerry Campbell

Gerry was one of tens of thousands of newly arrived migrants who ended up working for James Hardy whose callous occupational safety record led to hundreds of employees contracting asbestosis. Rather than be bitter and angry about it, he considered having got a job with them fortunate to establish himself and family in a new country. This remarkable attitude was not an isolated one for he never lost hope as the cancer spread across his body and he suffered other health conditions Gerry had a big heart but not many know some aspects of his boundless generosity and charity. Gerry and his wife Sue have been volunteering at the Multicultural Services Centre on a weekly basis for many years, where Gerry's culinary skills were enjoyed by our frail aged consumers. He continued to volunteer his services between bouts of chemo and radiotherapy. What's more they both refused to accept the honorarium that we provide our volunteers. So, it was hardly surprising that Gerry gifted his mortal remains to the UWA medical school.



#### Vale Leela De Mel

Leela's splendid legacy has not been adequately acknowledged let alone celebrated by our sector for it was her in her capacity as the Executive Director of the Office of Multicultural Interests who had the responsibility to implement the Gallop government's admirable multiculturalism scaffolding comprising the Multiculturalism Charter, the Anti-Racism Strategy, the Substantive Equality and the Language Service policies. The role she played was well summed up by Dr Gallop in his tribute to her i.e. "When it came to the range of policies related to multiculturalism and anti-racism I was fortunate to have Leela de Mel as Executive Director of the Office of Multicultural Interests. She fully understood what it was the government intended, was resolute in her support for the policies when the inevitable challenges emerged and through all of this acted in a dignified and respectful way."

In 2011, MSC won the tender to provide the Accommodation and related component of the Humanitarian Support Service and it became its single largest program. Regrettably, a very senior official in the Department of Immigration, on the basis of unsubstantiated reasons, pressured the board to impose changes to how and who administered the program. MSC's highly professional and experienced board of management of which Leela was a member, took her advice and firmly resisted the pressure that was placed on it. Leela also had significant input on many programs and services that MSC developed and implemented.

# Multicultural Supported Disability Accommodation

Work has entered into a contract to demolish its former Morley Office at 64 Wellington Road and build WA's and possibly Australia's first Multicultural Supported Disability Accommodation. The facility with seven High Care rooms with attached bathrooms is scheduled to be completed in midlate 2022.

# My Health Our Health (MHOH)

Several aspects of this program were innovative and the most notable one was the unfunded Hepatitis testing initiative that MSC initiated. 349 people participated and those who tested positive in some age groups were disproportionately very high compared to the Australian born, some as high as 34%. All of them fell through the cracks of the Immigration entry health checks, post arrival health checks, the primary health care system etc. but with MSC's support all those who needed treatment accessed it.

# Muresk project - Work in Agriculture Skillset course for CaLD Australians







The program's annual grant/income has grown from \$841,978 in 2010-11 to \$3,614,398 in 20201-21



### 2021 MSC Disability Participants Survey - Key Results

- 89.5% of participants surveyed reported being satisfied with services MSC provided with only 1 reporting being dissatisfied and 4 being neutral in their response.

# Partnerships with multicultural and mainstream organisations, and peak bodies

The Centre has always pursued a collaborative approach to ensure that the needs of ethnic Western Australians are met equitably and in a culturally appropriate manner. Our links with several multicultural and mainstream organisations, including peak bodies remain strong. The agencies that we have worked with are listed below.

Our approach to collaboration has been very successful because of our commitments to mutual trust and respect, willingness to share resources and associated risks, accommodating the other party's expectations, standards etc. MSC's substantial and exceptional record in working collaboratively with other organisations to deliver high quality outcomes for vulnerable clients can be gauged from the following services that it provides.

- 1. Family Dispute Resolutions Counselling: In collaboration with Relationship Australia (Lead agency) since 2008 together with Perth Central & East Metro Medicare Local and UnitingcareWest.
- 2. Employment Preparation and Coaching Services under the CaLD Workforce Development Centre Program in collaboration with MercyCare (Lead agency) 2010 to 2018.
- 3. Partners in Recovery program. Between 2014 and 2019 with Black Swan Health (lead agency) and twelve mainstream agencies as other consortium partners.
- 4. Subsidised Community Housing provision to low-income migrants in collaboration with Community Housing Limited (CHL). MSC has 11 houses it head leases from the Department of Housing (DoH) and "subleases" to CHL.
- 5. My Health Our Health program MSC was the lead agency partnering with Hepatitis WA, SHQ, WA AIDS Council, SIREN and RPH, since 2016-2019.
- 6. Vimauna FDV project (since May 2021) MSC is the lead agency partnering with Ishar, ECCWA and about 25 ethnic community groups and organisations.
- 7. CaLD Jobs Skills Centre Program Since July 2021 MSC has been working closely with Central Regional, South and North Metropolitan TAFEs, a number of RTOs and other educational institutions, employment services providers, employers etc. to provide a range of employment and training related services for CaLD communities.
- 8. Our settlement service programs in Perth, Mandurah and Bunbury are delivered in partnership with many mainstream and multicultural providers as well as the Mandurah and Bunbury LGAs.
- 9. Assisted Rental Pathways Pilot This project funded by the Department of Communities and implemented in partnership with MSC, Centrecare, Salvation Army, Outcare won a Silver Award for collaboration in 2018 from IPAA, for collaboration between a State government agency and the NFP sector.
- 10. MSC's My Home project was initiated in collaboration with Graylands Hospital and it was a shortlisted finalist for the 2021 IPAA Award for collaboration between a State government agency and the NFP sector.

The above partnerships have worked well since inception and the relevant organisations and their funding bodies will confirm that high quality outcomes were achieved.

MSC also has strong links with formal and informal leaders of new and emerging communities in Perth, Mandurah, Bunbury, Katanning and Albany as well as with regional service providers.

Other examples of working collaboratively with organisations include:

- Metropolitan Migrant Resource Centre (Lead agency), St Vincent De Paul Society and ASeTTS in implementing the IHSS program.
- PVS and St Vincent de Paul Society in implementing the HSS program.

To optimise collaboration, our approach has included establishing project/program steering committees and a commitment to Continuous Improvement at both program and organisational levels. In the case of the former they assist us to oversee the implementation of relevant programs/projects and we have had no difficulty in attracting relevant professionals and representatives of stakeholder agencies to participate in them. Reviewing the mechanisms in place to foster collaboration and exploring ways to improve is an integral part of the latter



### 6.30 pm Program starts with the UN video

### 6.35 Welcome and Introductions

#### Hebah

My name is Hebah Haris and I work as a Caseworker with our Multicultural Children Services program. Ramdas and I will be your hosts for this enjoyable and thought-provoking event.

I will start by acknowledging the Wadjuk people of the Noongar nation, the traditional owners of the land we are meeting on and pay my respects to their leaders, past, present and emerging.

The video we just screened was a part of a special opening to the UN General Assembly high-level meeting on 22-Sept-2021 in commemoration of the 20th anniversary of the Durban Declaration and Programme of Action against racism. We chose to open our event with this video for today happens to be Human Rights Day. Human Rights underpin the service philosophy of our agency and has been recognised as such by external quality auditors. I am sure it is also near and dear to all of you.

Whilst MSC has been travelling north quite rapidly since it celebrated its 30th anniversary, so have our esteemed Prime Minister and our very own Rockstar Premier, who were then the Shadow Minister for Immigration and the WA Opposition Leader respectively. Today we will be showing our appreciation to speakers, sponsors and others in a way that many of us are not accustomed to and that is by waving like this, instead of clapping. The reason why we have chosen to wave, will become clearer as the event unfolds.

There will be several references to our Sponsors tonight for without their generous support this event would never have been held at such a magnificent venue. Stanley College is our Platinum sponsor and they deserve special applause. The Training Alliance Group, the Australian Technical College and Community and Commercial Insurance are our Gold sponsors and our Silver Sponsors are Hoban and Ishar. Please join me in showing our immense appreciation to our sponsors by waving.

I am very new to this sector, just about 8 weeks to be precise, but I am already aware of the endless hours that many of us work. As a young mother I am acutely aware of what our partners and family members do for us and they deserve our special thanks for their support and understanding. But for the added responsibilities that they have so graciously accepted, our goal to serve MSC and the community the way we do, would never have been realised. Please join me in showing our immense gratitude to our partners and family members by waving.

#### Ramdas

Today is an auspicious day not just because it is Human Rights Day but because it also happens to be the birthdays of Suresh Rajan the President of the Ethnic Communities Council, Said Padshah, Minister Buti's Adviser and the late Dr Leela de Mel former MSC board member and former Executive Director of OMI. Sadly, Leela has passed on but on your behalf, I wish Suresh and Said a very happy birthday. Hebah mentioned that this event will be thought- provoking and you will soon see that besides the urgent need to tackle racism effectively, in the limited time we have we will also be raising other issues that we should all be concerned about. One of them is mental health. According to the Office of the UN Human Rights Commissioner, Mental Health is a Human Right. I wish to acknowledge the presence of Dr Nathan Gibson our Chief Psychiatrist and the Hon Margaret Quirk MLA who in her capacity as Minister for Citizenship and Multicultural Interests in the Gallop government took mental health very seriously. She established a grant for the provision of a clinical multicultural mental health service. MSC won that tender bid and established Maitri. Unfortunately ministers who followed her did not take this matter seriously, but we have every reason to believe that Minister Buti will be different. However, we are not taking any chances and Dr Gibson, we are counting on you to convince the Minister within the next two hours. Mainstreaming and place-based service philosophies, obviously have an important role in how our community services are delivered. However, there is no justification for mindless mainstreaming or place being defined in narrow geographic terms. Is it not reasonable for ethnic minority taxpayers to expect an equitable share of the taxes that they pay to be returned to the multicultural sector for the provision of multicultural and multilingual clinical mental health services? Minister, even a cursory

examination of the WA Primary Health Alliance and the Mental Health Commission's funding allocations for many years will show that multicultural service providers have received just a nanoscopic portion of it.

### 6.50 Screening of the 40th Anniversary Video "I live for Mondays"

As you saw in the Video acknowledgments, we dedicated the video to Aunty Maria who shared the 4 very powerful words, "I live for Mondays" three days before her passing, when Ramdas visited her at a Hospice along with our volunteer, Geeta and Aunty Jessie, a consumer. To contextualise this, Monday is the day that Aunty Maria used to access our CHSP services. In the last 40 years, MSC has attracted loads of memorable testimonials and awards from various sources, but according to Ramdas, nothing comes remotely close to those four words for they epitomise our raison d'etre.

I will come to that after we listen to the song Kaatrin Mozhi, meaning the Language of the Wind. As we listen to that song we are screening along with the lyrics, the rationale for the concept of listen the way we have. The listen image idea was proposed by Visual artist Carl Gopalakrishnan and developed by Devlin. Please join me in thanking them.

We will now listen to the song Kaatrin Mozhi, whilst its very thought-provoking lyrics along with rationale of our Listen image are screened.

This item is memorable for two very important reasons. It emphasises the fact that despite 68+languages spoken by MSC personnel, no one had the capacity to communicate in Auslan until very recently. I am pleased to advise that 30 of our staff have now completed a basic course in Auslan delivered by Access Plus and a staff member who will soon join us is fluent in it. Hopefully at least another 70 of our staff will do the course in the New Year. We encourage all agencies present today to take up the training opportunity that Access Plus provides to ensure deaf and hard of hearing Western Australians have culturally and linguistically appropriate and equitable access to your services.

The second reason is the sentiment that was conveyed to me via email by the CEO of Access Plus, Rebecca Adam, and I quote, "I want to thank you for welcoming Access Plus to the MSC family, we feel very much at home already! Deaf people have always identified with the CaLD community and not with the disability community. So, it is really no surprise to me that we've found ourselves working together as seamlessly as this." Thanks again Rebecca, and I now call upon you to address us.
